

Bonus 3: Top 25 Polite Power Phrases

Friendly, Respectful Spanish You Can Actually Use in Mexico

You don't need perfect Spanish to come across well in Mexico, but knowing a few courteous phrases that sound natural can be very useful in real life.

This bonus is built for exactly that. These are the phrases that help you ask, thank, clarify, decline, apologize, and move through daily life without sounding abrupt, stiff, or accidentally demanding. In Mexico, that matters. A lot of everyday courtesy is said verbally and even simple phrases can change the whole tone of an interaction.

Use these often. They are small, but they do real work.

Greetings & Openers

1. Hola, buenos días.

OH-lah, bweh-NOHS DEE-ahs

Hello, good morning.

2. Buenas tardes.

BWEH-nahs TAR-dehs

Good afternoon.

3. Buenas noches.

BWEH-nahs NO-chehs

Good evening / good night.

4. Mucho gusto.

MOO-choh GOOS-toh

Nice to meet you.

5. Disculpe...

dees-KOOL-peh

Excuse me...

Why they matter: In Mexico, greeting first is one of the easiest and most important signs that you understand how social interaction begins.

Asking Politely

6. ¿Me puede ayudar?

meh PWEH-deh ah-yoo-DAR?

Can you help me?

7. ¿Me podría decir...?

meh poh-DREE-ah deh-SEER...?

Could you tell me...?

8. ¿Dónde está...?

DON-deh ehs-TAH...?

Where is...?

9. ¿Cuánto cuesta?

KWAHN-toh KWEHS-tah?

How much does it cost?

10. ¿Aquí se paga?

ah-KEE seh PAH-gah?

Do you pay here?

Why they matter: In Mexico, the softener often matters as much as the question itself. These phrases help you ask without sounding abrupt.

Everyday Courtesy

11. Por favor.

pohr fah-VOR

Please.

12. Gracias.

GRAH-see-ahs

Thank you.

13. Muchas gracias.

MOO-chahs GRAH-see-ahs

Thank you very much.

14. Muy amable.

moo-ee ah-MAH-bleh

Very kind of you.

15. Con permiso.

kohn pehr-MEE-soh

Excuse me / with your permission.

16. Perdón.

pehr-DOHN

Sorry / pardon me.

Why they matter: These are the phrases that keep public life moving smoothly in Mexico. They are not decorative. They are part of the rhythm.

Clarifying & Navigating

17. ¿Quién es el último?

kee-EHN ehs ehl OOL-tee-moh?

Who's last?

18. ¿Es aquí?

ehs ah-KEE?

Is it here?

19. Más o menos, ¿a qué hora?

mahs oh MEH-nohs, ah keh OH-rah?

Roughly, at what time?

20. ¿Está bien así?

ehs-TAH byen ah-SEE?

Is this okay like this?

Why they matter: Mexico often runs on implied systems, soft time language, and context. These phrases help you clarify without sounding pushy.

Saying No Warmly

21. No, gracias.

noh GRAH-see-ahs

No, thank you.

22. Estoy bien, gracias.

ehs-TOY byen, GRAH-see-ahs

I'm fine, thank you.

23. No me interesa.

noh meh een-teh-REH-sah

I'm not interested (not strictly warm, but a good way to discourage sales hawking an unwanted attention)

24. Prefiero no, gracias.

preh-fee-EH-roh noh, GRAH-see-ahs

I'd prefer not to, thank you.

Why they matter: In Mexico, a warm refusal often lands better than a blunt one. You do not need to over-explain, but you also do not need to sound harsh.

One Phrase That Solves a Lot

25. Muchas gracias, de verdad.

MOO-chahs GRAH-see-ahs, deh vehr-DAHD

Thank you very much, truly.

Why it matters: When someone has been especially helpful, kind, patient, or generous, this phrase lands well. It sounds sincere without sounding formal or stiff.

Best Ways to Use These Phrases

Use tone, not just vocabulary

In Mexico, a simple phrase with a calm voice and respectful tone usually works better than a complicated sentence delivered nervously.

Do not wait until your Spanish is “good enough”

Polite effort counts. Most people will understand what you mean and appreciate that you are trying.

Repeat them until they become automatic

That is the real goal. Once these phrases are part of your living vocabulary instead of hiding in your notes app, Mexico starts feeling much easier.

In Mexico, politeness is often visible, verbal, and surprisingly practical. These phrases do more than make you sound nice. They help you enter interactions properly, ask for what you need without friction, and move through daily life with more ease.
